Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: In this gospel for Good Shepherd Sunday, Jesus mixes his metaphors a bit. We usually think of him as the Good Shepherd, and he is that; he is the one who contrasts with the thief sneaking in to steal and slaughter. He is the one who calls us by name and whose voice we know. He is the one who provides our sustenance and protection. But in this parable, he also identifies himself as the gate into the sheepfold. This is an even humbler image than that of shepherd, for in this metaphor, he is not even human. He is our way, our path to all that is good and real. It is through him that we enter safety and rest. And it is he who serves as our protection, because he has conquered those evil forces in the world that would wish us harm.

To Experience: For many of us, baptism was long ago. We take for granted that we are part of God's flock of sheep and do not remember what it was like to ever be outside it. This is an important season to listen to the witness of those more newly initiated into the church; their stories of coming in from the outside are often very powerful and can remind us of what we're about. If you are a newer convert, consider ways you might share your story with those around you.

- There are at least two related images for Christ in today's readings: he is both the shepherd who guides and protects us and the gate into the sheepfold, our point of entry into safety and rest. Which of these images do you prefer? Why?
- 2. The first reading emphasizes that repentance and baptism are the appropriate responses to the good news of Christ. How do you live out the call of your baptism in a continuous way, even if it occurred long ago?
- 3. It can feel like the members of a flock of sheep have no individuality, but Christ's images of shepherding often stress the individual love he carries for each of us. How could you care for a member of your community in an individualized way this Easter season?

Year of Mary October 1, 2022 to December 8, 2023

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On the Fourth Sunday of Easter, we always read from the tenth chapter of the Gospel of John, which is commonly referred to as the "Good Shepherd Discourse." Because priests should model their lives on the example of Christ the Good Shepherd, priestly ordinations are often celebrated on this Sunday. Additionally, this Sunday is associated with preaching about priestly vocations.

This week, Bishop Ricken invited all the priests serving in the Diocese of Green Bay to join him in a meeting to discuss this week's readings and encouraged us to preach on vocations this weekend. Instead of presenting us with a new vocations program, he invited us to pray over the scriptures in a group meditation. Each priest was offered the opportunity to share how God was speaking to his heart through these biblical readings. Unfortunately, it's not common for priests to gather with the bishop with the only purpose of the meeting being to pray together. It really was a touching shared experience.

One priest shared that these words spoke to him: "They recognize his voice" (John 10:4b). These are the same words that spoke to me. This priest pondered, whether or not people still recognize the voice of Jesus, the Good Shepherd? He observed that our world is filled with distractions, noise, and often hours filled with activities, sometimes almost frenetic activity. And amidst all this noise, the sweet and loving voice of the Good Shepherd gets lost. As a result, the Lord is calling, but we cannot hear.

I agree.

There is an antidote to this noise and distraction. We need to slow down and intentionally seek out silence and solitude. We can turn off our music, radios, televisions and other devices, but often it is the noise that arises from within our hearts and minds that distracts us more. These days it takes time to learn to be silent. But it is worth the effort. Silence brings its own reward: "Through silence, we return to our heavenly origin, where there is nothing but calm, peace, repose, silent contemplation, and adoration of the radiant face of God" (from Cardinal Robert Sarah's book The Power of Silence).

When we cultivate silence not only in our home environment, but more importantly silence in our hearts and minds, we find that the silence is not empty nor is it quiet. Silence is filled with the presence of God. And in silence, we recognize the voice of the Good Shepherd.

Our Lady of Fatima Feast Day—May 13

Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese children– Francisco and Jacinta Marto and their cousin Lucia dos Santos–received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria near Fatima. Mary asked the children to pray the rosary for world peace, for the end of World War I, for sinners, and for the conversion of Russia.



Mary gave the children three secrets. Following the deaths of Francisco and Jacinta in 1919 and 1920 respectively, Lucia revealed the first secret in 1927. It concerned devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The second secret was a vision of hell. When Lucia grew up she became a Carmelite nun and died in 2005 at the age of 97.


Pope John Paul II directed the Holy See's Secretary of State to reveal the third secret in 2000; it spoke of a "bishop in white" who was shot by a group of soldiers who fired bullets and arrows into him. Many people linked this vision to the assassination attempt against Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Square on May 13, 1981.

The feast of Our Lady of Fatima was approved by the local bishop in 1930; it was added to the Church's worldwide calendar in 2002.



Pray for the priests who have ministered to you throughout your life, both living and dead. Encourage your children, grandchildren, or other young people to consider a vocation as a priest or religious brother or sister. Pray a rosary for more young men and women in our diocese to respond to God's call.



Pray for Voca-

tions! As Catholics, we firmly believe that God has a plan for our lives! He calls some to marriage, some to the priesthood, and others to religious life or to

live as generous single people. Fully living our own vocations—and teaching young people how to discern God's call—is a serious duty, but also a joyful one. During this week, please encourage the young people in your life—children, grandchildren, students, and friends—to be open if God calls them to priesthood or religious life.

Teach Your Children to Use GPS

After Mass today, have a conversation with your children, asking, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" After a few moments of discussion, ask, "Who do you think God wants you to be when you grow up?" Emphasize to your children that God has a specific plan in mind for them, and that following God's plan is the surest way to happiness. Every life decision—which college to attend, whom to date, which job to pursue, whether to enter seminary, whom to marry—should be undertaken only after praying for God's guidance. In other words, encourage kids to navigate life using GPS—God's Positioning System.

May has been Mary's month since the medieval period, when May was considered the end of winter and the start of a new season of growth. It's a time for new beginnings and the


chance to begin with gratitude and devotion.

National Day of Prayer

The National Day of Prayer is an annual observance held on the first Thursday of May, inviting people to pray for the nation. It was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of the United States Congress, and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman.

The National Day of Prayer has great significance for us as a nation as it enables us to recall and to teach the way in which our founding fathers sought the wisdom of God when faced with critical decisions. It stands as a call for us to humbly come before God, seeking His guidance for our leaders and His grace upon us as a people. The unanimous passage of the bill establishing the National Day of Prayer as an annual event, signifies that prayer is as important to our nation today as it was in the beginning.

Like Thanksgiving or Christmas, this day has become a national observance placed on all Hallmark calendars and observed annually across the nation and in Washington, DC. Every year, local, state, and federal observances were held from sunrise in Maine to sunset in Hawaii, uniting Americans from all socio-economic, political, and ethnic backgrounds in prayer for our nation. It is estimated that over two million people attended more than 30,000 observances organized by approximately 40,000 volunteers. At state capitols, county court houses, on the steps of city halls, and in schools, businesses, churches and homes, people stopped their activities and gathered for prayer.





Saint Joseph the Worker—May 1, Feast Day

This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.

Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by -side in Joseph's carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. Pope John Paul II stated: "the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society." Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work.
