Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: We are past the midpoint of the Easter season, and the readings start to turn from the immediate aftermath of the resurrection and toward the ongoing work the church will face after Jesus' bodily presence departs earth. We see that while the work of Easter is complete in one sense – Jesus has conquered death once and for all—it will be an ongoing project to bring it to its fullness. Jesus has gone ahead of us in death and has conquered it for us so that we might participate in his life. In this gospel, Jesus tells us that he will go ahead of us to heaven, as well, but it is not to leave us alone. He goes ahead to open the way for us and to prepare our place there. Jesus also affirms his unity with his Father here; he already dwells in the Father and the Father in him, and we are called to follow him into such intimacy with God, which is truly heaven.

To Experience: Some of the metaphors in these readings can seem obscure and unreachable. We are to wait for Jesus to prepare a place for us in his Father's house; we are in the meantime to become living stones built into another house. Reflecting on themes of home and hospitality might help these readings take on a more robust meaning.

1. Reflect on what the word "home" means to you and the places that have been your home. How do these places impact how you envision the place Jesus is preparing for you?
2. What role does hospitality play in your life? How might you, called to be a "living stone," help to create a home for others?
3. Do you find it easy or hard to trust God in the long wait for God's promises to be fully realized?

Hear to Serve

WORD AND SERVICE

In today's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we can peek back in time to the early Church and see how the roles of Bishops and Deacons were defined.

It didn't take long for complaints in the Church to start coming in. The Hellenists (Greeks) complained that their widows are being ignored in the distribution of food. So, the Twelve (these are the Apostles, the first Bishops) gathered with the whole community of disciples and declared, "It's not right for us to neglect the Word of God to serve at table."

The Apostles, the first Bishops, were making clear from the start that their primary role is not to be direct service to the people. Their primary role is to pray for their people, to study, proclaim, and preach the Word of God to the people. Through Apostolic succession, the bishops' role has remained much the same through the ages. It's through the bishops' prayer and study that they are able to direct the proper charisms for the Church.

The Apostles said, "Friends, select from among yourselves seven men of good standing, full of the Spirit and wisdom, whom we may appoint to this task. While we for our part will devote ourselves to prayer."

What we have just seen here by the selection of seven reputable men is the birth of the Diaconate in the Catholic Church. They had men stand before the Apostles who prayed and laid their hands on them. Just as it was done on that very first Diaconate Ordination, it is still done the same way today.

The deacons did the very important task of seeing to the physical needs of the people and the distribution of goods. They had a very hands-on service role. They were the bishops' eyes and ears. However, the early deacons also preached the gospel and evangelized because Stephen, one of the seven, was eventually stoned to death for his preaching and evangelizing in the name of Jesus. The first martyr in the Church was a deacon.

Beginning in the 5th century, the Diaconate started to decline as more men were ordained priests. Eventually it was put on hiatus. A revival of the Permanent Diaconate occurred with Pope Paul VI and Vatican II.

Permanent Deacons (those who are not going to be ordained priests) are still in direct service to their bishop. They are ordained to assist at liturgy, preach the gospel, baptize, witness marriages, visit the sick, and be of service to the poor. Most deacons are assigned to a parish to assist the priest and parishioners as needed. The deacon's role in the Church varies according to his time and talents. Deacons are not paid which means we have secular jobs. (It is true that some deacons are hired by a parish to fill a staff position.) Our first duty, if we are married, is to our wife and family. As you can see, a deacon has one foot in the Church and one in the secular world (try that without doing the splits).

Becoming a deacon is an answer to a very personal call from God to share the Good News of Christ. Deacons are sent out as a servant of Christ to bring charity to the world, each in his own unique way. They are ordained as a sacramental sign to the Church and to the world of Christ, who came 'to serve and not to be served'. Please say an extra prayer today for all deacons and for those men who are discerning the Diaconate.

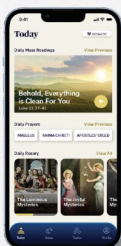

Couple cast as extras in 'The Chosen'

STURGEON BAY — It's not everyone who gets to visit the scene of one of Jesus' miracles — and never has to leave the country.

Last June, Sue and Shaun Melarvie became one of 5,000 extras on the set of "The Chosen," the Angel Studios' streaming series about Jesus' life.

The couple spent three days near Midlothian, Texas, in heat over 100 degrees, to help depict the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes.

Shaun has put together a PowerPoint presentation of the experience. The couple recently spoke before members of the St. Ann's Society at their parish, Corpus Christi in Sturgeon Bay.

It all began when the Melarvies started watching The Chosen on their phone before it became easier to find on other venues.

"I was hooked," Shaun said. "It's a crowd-funded enterprise, so I donated a small amount, about \$100." That got the couple on the mailing list and, about a year later, they were notified of the opportunity to become an extra for a donation of \$1,000.

"I sent them the \$1,000, but

it was first-come, first served," Shaun said.

They were two of the lucky ones.

Three months before filming, they received directions for everything they needed to provide their own costumes. Some people scoured second-hand

stores, but since Sue is a seamstress and quilter, she made their costumes, choosing from among the four or five available patterns with no buttons, buckles or other modern embellishments.

Marian Shrine of Our Lady changes name in Champion

CHAMPION — Life changed in October 1859 for a Belgian immigrant woman named Adele Brise living in northeast Wisconsin. She met "the Queen of Heaven who prays for the conversion of sinners," a spiritual encounter that led to what is today the only approved

Marian apparition site in the United States.

Meeting the Blessed Mother brought huge changes to Adele's life and, ultimately, to the faith life of Catholics in northeast Wisconsin.

Another big change was announced on April 20 this year: The name of the apparition site, located at 4047 Chapel Drive in New Franken, is now "The National Shrine of Our Lady of Champion."

The site was most recently called "The National Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help." The official name change comes after Vatican approval was received of an annual feast day Mass to be celebrated at the Shrine each Oct. 9, beginning in 2023.

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Pentecost

1 Pentecost falls on May 28 this year, celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit — bringing gifts. The gifts of the Spirit unite us with God and with each other. Church history designates seven gifts of the Spirit:

2 Wisdom brings the ability to recognize God and God's works. Related to that is Knowledge, which gives clear insight in discerning truth from error.

3 Understanding applies knowing about church teachings. It is related to Counsel which imparts the ability to know what to do in any situation.

4 Fortitude is the strength to persevere in the crosses on the way.

5 Piety increases the desire to give God glory and to do good." Fear of the Lord is similar, but also adds "reverence" for God.

Allowing God to transform your life through his word

Have you ever been at Mass and, as you listen to the readings, you feel as if God is speaking directly to you? You feel as if he knows your situation and needs and is speaking directly into your life.

The reason you and I feel that is because he is speaking directly to us! The God of the Universe, who created all things, has given us his word — sacred Scripture — to reveal himself and speak directly to us. It is as if God had looked over your whole life and took the time to write to you a personal love letter.

Since God's Word is so personal and precious, we ought to take time to read it. Ideally, we should do that each day to receive his comfort, care and guidance for our busy lives. As Pope Francis said in *Evangelii Gaudium* (152), "There

is one particular way of listening to what the Lord wishes to tell us in his word and of letting ourselves be transformed by the Spirit. It is what we call *lectio divina*."

Yes, God's word, prayerfully read and pondered over, can transform us through the power of the Holy Spirit. I don't know about you, but I am always seeking for my life to be transformed by the Holy Spirit.

How do we experience this transformation in *lectio divina* (Latin for "divine reading")? We do this by pausing from our busy lifestyles to ponder God's Word. We let go of our agenda and open ourselves to what God wants to say to us.

Lectio divina is a simple four-step process that old and young alike can do. I always begin by asking the Holy Spirit to guide my reading of Scripture and allow him to reveal what he wishes.
