Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: On retreats, the story of the transfiguration is often used to charge participants with living out the retreat as they return to the more mundane

rhythms of daily life. They may have experienced God in a powerful way, but like the disciples in this story, they must come down from the "mountaintop" of that experience to walk in the valleys below. Talking about their experience might be met with doubt or suspicion, and it is unlikely that the demands of real life will allow them the space and time to have the emotionally powerful experience of God that often occurs in a retreat setting. But, like the disciples, they do not go forth alone. Jesus remains with them—and with us. And our more powerful experiences of intimacy with him can go a long way in enlightening and empowering the more normal parts of our journeys of faith.

To Experience: Many of us are blessed at some point with "mountaintop experiences," where God's presence is clear and obvious and stimulates an emotional response commensurate with God's vast goodness. But our lives are not usually lived under conditions that permit constant emotional stimulus. Emotions are part of our human condition—changeable, unpredictable, tied closely to the last time we ate and whether we got enough sleep last night. Walking in the everyday "valleys" of our life calls for staying committed to God when the emotional payoff is low. This is where love becomes a virtue rather than an emotion.

- 1. What "mountaintop experiences" have you had where Jesus felt very real and present? What did they reveal to you about him?
- 2. What in your daily life makes it hard to experience God's presence and power?
- 3. What tools do you use when Jesus' presence is not so obvious or emotional? Are there prayer techniques you rely on?

"Be still and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Peace be with you. You will have noticed that over the past few weeks I have returned to emphasizing the importance of prayer in my bulletin columns. There is one simple reason for this: Prayer works.

This is not just simply a theoretical proposition. Parishes that thrive are parishes that pray.

In last Sunday's first reading, we heard the Lord God address these words to King Solomon: "Because you have asked for this [wisdom], and not for a long life for yourself, nor for riches, nor for the life of your enemies, but for understanding so that you may know what is right - I do as you requested. I give you a heart that is wise and understanding" (1 Kings 3:11-12), but the Lord continues, "I will also give you for what you have not asked, both riches and honor" (1 Kings 3:13).

Jesus echoes this idea towards the end of the Sermon on the Mount, "Seek first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness, and all these things will be added onto you" (Matthew 6:33).

Prayer can seem like a luxury or even a waste of time when there is a lot of work that needs to be done. But the principle from scripture is that placing God first in prayer does not distract us from our work, but makes our work more effective. When we place work first, we are depending on our own strength, our own endurance, and our own effort. The thing is even the strongest person has limited strength, even the most persistent person will reach a point of fatigue, and even the greatest human effort falls short.

Where we fall short, we can remember the words of St. Paul, "The foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men" (1 Corinthians 1:25). And Paul's encouraging words, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13).

When we place God first, we are no longer depending on our limited strength, but rather we are depending on the strength that comes from the Lord. And his strength will not fail.

This is the reason why St. Francis de Sales famously gives the following advice on how to pray, "Every Christian needs a half hour of prayer a day, except when we are busy - then we need an hour."

Missionary Cooperation Plan Collection Weekend of August 12 & 13

(MCP) is promoted through the Catholic Foundation World Mission office every summer, and is conducted in dioceses across the United States. These collections are a way to centralize the efforts of missionary organizations around the world who wish to appeal to Catholics in the U.S.

Each year, from over 300 applications, Bishop Ricken invites 38 groups to participate. This Appeal allows mission groups to make a personal appeal for prayers and financial support from Catholics in our diocese. In our Diocese, receipts from all the 156 parishes are pooled and divided equally among these selected mission groups. We use this fairshare system to enable our missionary speakers to go to less populated parishes in our Diocese without fear of receiving less income.

Missionaries share the needs and their faith experiences of the people they serve. Missionaries enrich us in our understanding of the problems and challenges of the global church. Our faith is deepened and broadened as we learn from them.



Saint Clare of Assisi's Story Feast Day: August 11

One of the more sugary movies made about Francis of Assisi pictures Clare as a golden-haired beauty floating through sun-drenched fields, a sort of one-woman counterpart to the new Franciscan Order.

The beginning of her religious life was indeed movie material. Having refused to marry at 15, Clare was moved by the dynamic preaching of Francis. He became her lifelong friend and spiritual guide.

At 18, Clare escaped from her father's home one night, was met on the road by friars carrying torches, and in the poor little chapel called the Portiuncula received a rough woolen habit, exchanged her jeweled belt for a common rope with knots in it, and sacrificed her long tresses to Francis' scissors. He placed her in a Benedictine convent, which her father and uncles immediately stormed in rage. Clare clung to the altar of the church, threw aside her veil to show her cropped hair, and remained adamant.

Sixteen days later her sister Agnes joined her. Others came. They lived a simple life of great poverty, austerity, and complete seclusion from the world, according to a Rule which Francis gave them as a Second Order. At age 21, Francis obliged Clare under obedience to accept the office of abbess, one she exercised until her death.

The Poor Ladies went barefoot, slept on the ground, ate no meat, and observed almost complete silence. Later Clare, like Francis, persuaded her sisters to moderate this rigor: "Our bodies are not made of brass." The greatest emphasis, of course, was on gospel poverty. They possessed no property, even in common, subsisting on daily contributions. When even the pope tried to persuade Clare to mitigate this practice, she showed her characteristic firmness: "I need to be absolved from my sins, but I do not wish to be absolved from the obligation of following Jesus Christ."

Contemporary accounts glow with admiration of Clare's life in the convent of San Damiano in Assisi. She served the sick and washed the feet of the begging nuns. She came from prayer, it was said, with her face so shining it dazzled those about her. She suffered serious illness for the last 27 years of her life. Her influence was such that popes, cardinals, and bishops often came to consult her—Clare herself never left the walls of San Damiano.

Francis always remained her great friend and inspiration. Clare was always obedient to his will and to the great ideal of gospel life which he was making real.



A well-known story concerns her prayer and trust. Clare had the Blessed Sacrament placed on the walls of the convent when it faced attack by invading Saracens. "Does it please you, O God, to deliver into the hands of these beasts the defenseless children I have nourished with your love? I beseech you, dear Lord, protect these whom I am now unable to protect." To her sisters she said, "Don't be afraid. Trust in Jesus." The Saracens fled.
