Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: In this gospel, Jesus calls us to radically generous forgiveness, a magnitude of forgiveness far above Peter's guess at what generous forgiveness should be. Again, God's logic is not ours; this is not a

transaction that makes sense on human terms. This is not a transaction that makes sense on human terms. This is one more way that we are called to imitate God, whose mercy is boundless and to whom we owe much more than we are owed. Imitating God in forgiveness is about making us bigger; it expands over hearts so that we may participate more fully in God's life and triumph and joy. But as we saw last week, this call to generous forgiveness doesn't mean we can't have boundaries. While most of us can stand to be more forgiving, God does not will for us to put up with true abuse. Forgiveness in such cases does not mean returning to an abuser with a blank slate and allowing the abuse to happen all over again; it might instead mean coming to a place of understanding even if the relationship cannot be restored.

To Experience: Even Peter's question is flawed; forgiveness is rarely a discreet, countable act. Granting forgiveness is not always as simple as checking a box to accomplish time number thirteen of the seventy-seven allotted. It can be hard to know when we've "achieved" full forgiveness; old hurts sometimes come back unexpectedly, revealing that they were not as healed as we once thought. More often, it is an ongoing process, one of changing our hearts, embracing humility and compassion, and being willing to be generous with others as God is with us.

- 1. Are there faults and hurts that you find easy to forgive? Are there any that you struggle to forgive fully?
- Sometimes forgiveness fully restores relationships and sometimes it moves them to a new phase with new boundaries. What does forgiveness look like in your life?
- 3. Which relationships in your life still need forgiveness's healing power?

Hear to Serve …

Whether We Live or Die In his Letter to the Romans, St. Paul tells us, "Brothers and sisters: None of us lives for

oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's."

Truer words were never spoken. I believe all of us as Catholics, as all Christians, would like nothing better to be said about us or inscribed on our tombstones than that we truly lived and died for the Lord.

Even though at our baptism we became part of God's family, brothers and sisters to Christ, we all know how very, very hard it can be to live and die for the Lord. Well, one thing we have to do is to have a rock-solid, steady relationship with Jesus. If we don't have that solid personal relationship with Jesus, we will never live for Him or much less, die for Him.

The way to develop that solid relationship with Jesus is through prayer. We have to pray. If we don't have a prayer life, nothing else is going to happen. Now just as living up to St. Paul's letter to the Romans this week is hard, praying and having a prayer life can be just as challenging to say the least.

This is why I want to recommend a book to you. It's called "Prayer For Beginners" by Peter Kreeft. It doesn't matter if your prayer life is at the beginning stages of life, or you are a seasoned prayer warrior doing rosaries and novenas that would make the Bishop envious, there is something in this book that will help you. One thing I know for sure is that learning to pray better is never ending.

Peter Kreeft tells us he wrote this book for the Marthas of the world, for people with little time to pray and for those who keep finding excuses not to pray. The author realizes that we are very busy, distracted people, and sometimes, let's face it, we are not very holy. (If you're like your Deacon, you're raising your hand right now.) You do not have to have an advanced degree in theology to read this book; it's written for us, the people in the everyday world. The chapters are short and to the point with everyday examples of what we face in the world before us. It is the kind of book that you can take your time reading.

The chapter I especially liked was titled, Patience, Forgiving Ourselves for Failure. The author talked about how we want to become holy all at once and go faster than the Grace of God which then leads to our demise. The chapter also brings up an interesting point about sin. Kreeft states that we like to think about our sins the way the devil wants us to think about them, rather than the way God wants us to think about our sins. God wants us to worry about our sins before we sin but the devil wants us to worry about them after we sin. God wants us to feel free to repent, while the devil wants us to feel free to sin.

I cannot say enough good things about this book. I urge you all to get it. I would also like to hear your comments and thoughts about the book. And as always, I give you the Deacon's guarantee: If you get this book and find absolutely nothing of value in it, I will pray for you twice as hard.

Let us improve and steady our relationship with Jesus so we can remember that in life and death, we are the Lord's.

Saint Pio of Pietrelcina's Story Feast Day—September 23

In one of the largest such ceremonies in history, Pope John Paul II canonized Padre Pio of Pietrelcina on June 16, 2002. It was the 45th canonization ceremony in Pope John Paul's pontificate. More than 300,000 people braved blistering heat as they filled St. Peter's Square and nearby streets. They heard the Holy Father praise the new saint for his prayer and charity. "This is the most concrete synthesis of Padre Pio's teaching," said the pope. He also stressed Padre Pio's witness to the power of suffering. If accepted with love, the Holy Father stressed, such suffering can lead to "a privileged path of sanctity."

Many people have turned to the Italian Capuchin Franciscan to intercede with God on their behalf; among them was the future Pope John Paul II. In 1962, when he was still an archbishop in Poland, he wrote to Padre Pio and asked him to pray for a Polish woman with throat cancer. Within two weeks, she had been cured of her life-threatening disease.

Born Francesco Forgione, Padre Pio grew up in a family of farmers in southern Italy. Twice his father worked in Jamaica, New York, to provide the family income.

At the age of 15, Francesco joined the Capuchins and took the name of Pio. He was ordained in 1910 and was drafted during World War I. After he was discovered to have tuberculosis, he was discharged. In 1917, he was assigned to the friary in San Giovanni Rotondo, 75 miles from the city of Bari on the Adriatic.

On September 20, 1918, as he was making his thanksgiving after Mass, Padre Pio had a vision of Jesus. When the vision ended, he had the stigmata in his hands, feet, and side.

Life became more complicated after that. Medical doctors, Church authorities, and curiosity seekers came to see Padre Pio. In 1924, and again in 1931, the authenticity of the stigmata was questioned; Padre Pio was not permitted to celebrate Mass publicly or to hear confessions. He did not complain of these decisions, which were soon reversed. However, he wrote no letters after 1924. His only other writing, a pamphlet on the agony of Jesus, was done before 1924.

Padre Pio rarely left the friary after he received the stigmata, but busloads of people soon began coming to see him. Each morning after a 5 a.m. Mass in a crowded church, he heard confessions until noon. He took a midmorning break to bless the sick and all who came to see him. Every afternoon he also heard confessions. In time his confessional ministry would take 10 hours a day; penitents had to take a number so that the situation could be handled. Many of them have said that Padre Pio knew details of their lives that they had never mentioned.

Padre Pio saw Jesus in all the sick and suffering. At his urging, a fine hospital was built on nearby Mount Gargano. The idea arose in 1940; a committee began to collect money. Ground was broken in 1946. Building the hospital was a technical wonder because of the difficulty of getting water there and of hauling up the building supplies. This "House for the Alleviation of Suffering" has 350 beds.

A number of people have reported cures they believe were received through the intercession of Padre Pio. Those who assisted at his Masses came away edified; several curiosity seekers were deeply moved. Like Saint Francis, Padre Pio sometimes had his habit torn or cut by souvenir hunters.

One of Padre Pio's sufferings was that unscrupulous people several times circulated prophecies that they claimed originated from him. He never made prophecies about world events and never gave an opinion on matters that he felt belonged to Church authorities to decide. He died on September 23, 1968, and was beatified in 1999.




