Breathed Into One Body

In today's Gospel, we find the disciples huddled behind closed doors, paralyzed by fear, grief, and uncertainty. The world outside felt hostile, and their hearts were shattered. It is precisely into this darkness that the resurrected Jesus steps.

He does not come with words of anger or blame for their past failures. Instead, He stands among them, speaks words of deep peace, breathes upon them, and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit."

This was not just a passing moment; it was the very birth of the Church. With that single, divine breath, Christ gave them—and us—a new life and a sacred mission. Strikingly, the very first grace Jesus attaches to this gift of the Holy Spirit is the power of forgiveness.

He knew that the greatest threat to our hearts and our communities would not be the storms on the outside, but the wounds and divisions on the inside.

True Pentecost revival is an invitation to unlock the closed doors of our own hearts, heal our divisions, and let go of old hurts. When we choose forgiveness over resentment, and humility over pride, we allow the Holy Spirit to truly live within us.

This week, let us pray for a deep, touching renewal within our families and our parish. May we yield to the Holy Spirit, heal our relationships, and journey forward as one, holy, unbreakable body in Christ.

Thoughts for Today's Readings



To the Point: Since the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost is recounted in today's first reading from Acts, the gospel reading taken from John shares a postresurrection appearance of Jesus. After the ascension, the church becomes essentially outward facing, missioned for the world. The descent of the Spirit at Pentecost is the primary catalyst of this mission, but this gospel reading also contains a commissioning story. Jesus breathes on the disciples, symbolically offering them the Holy Spirit, the breath of life and love shared between the Father and the Son. Interestingly, the primary task that the disciples receive from Jesus is the forgiveness of sins through the Spirit. Even in our time, when we receive the sacrament of reconciliation, the prayer of absolution tells us that the Holy Spirit is "poured out for the forgiveness of sins." The task of the Spirit is to gather us together in unity, wiping away those things that separates us from relationship with God and one another.

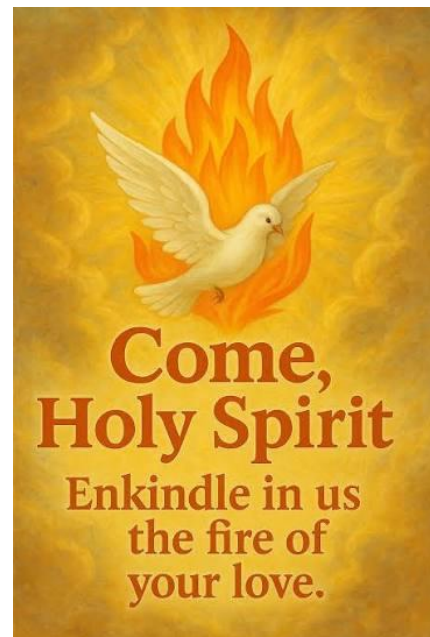
To Experience: For many people, consciously or unconsciously limited to a "man, man, bird" iconography of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit seems the least relatable person of God. As Jesus himself says, the world "neither sees nor knows it" (John 14:17). However, as Paul states in the second reading, "No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit." Whether we recognize it or not, whenever we turn to God, it is because the Holy Spirit is *already* at work in us. Out of the persons of the Trinity, it is particularly the Holy Spirit that dwells in our hearts, drawing us into relationship with God and others.

1. The second reading shares that in the same Spirit, there are many ways of being in the one Body of Christ. When have you grown in faith alongside others who have different gifts or spiritualities? What have you learned from their example?

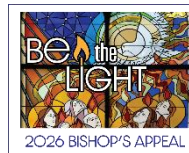

Witness Story

When my family first returned to the Church after an absence of several years, I understood little about our Catholic faith. I still did not fully understand what our “Sunday obligation” meant. I had only ever gone to confession once, and did not know that I needed to go at least once a year nor did I understand the concept of mortal sin. At the time, I was going through a very dark period, seriously struggling emotionally after a series of massive life changes: we had moved and started homesteading, our oldest was officially school-aged which meant I was officially homeschooling, and I was likely struggling with post-partum depression after the birth of our 5th child. “Stressed” doesn’t adequately describe how I was feeling, nor does the word “overwhelmed.” The biggest hurdle I was facing was this feeling of near constant anger that I, sadly, tended to take it out on our oldest and my husband. The amount of guilt and shame that I felt for doing so was unbearable. I had *wanted* this life and yet, I felt unequal to the task, like I was a miserable failure, and incredibly guilty. I prayed nightly for change in my behavior, pleaded for God’s help in moments of desperate frustration when I felt myself losing control, and quietly cried myself to sleep for several months.

One night, as I lay there praying, begging for God’s mercy and forgiveness, He quietly whispered to me that I needed to go to Confession. Mind you, I had no idea of the Church’s teaching on the subject and had never had a sense of “Catholic guilt,” so I genuinely did not understand why He was asking me to go. But God had spoken, and I knew I needed to listen. This is what He was asking of me, even if I didn’t understand it. So, I started to do my research, found out what is expected in the confessional, and did my best to prepare for the dreaded event, doing a thorough examination of conscience. Our poor priest at the time listened patiently through my lengthy confession, and I most definitely left having wept heartily out of shame and guilt. What I never expected was the amount of relief I would experience in going to God in that way. I had no idea what a profound impact that simple act of obedience would have on my struggles or my faith life, and I had never been told about the graces that are poured out on us when we receive absolution for our sins.

Though I wasn’t immediately remedied of all my problems, the difference I felt in my soul after that confession was profound. The anger and frustration and feelings of overwhelm quickly and steadily subsided. I was a bit nervous to make my way back to the confessional again, and knowing that unless I had mortally sinned, the Church recommended that I go at least once a year, I was fully prepared to wait until I “needed” to go again. But thanks to some encouragement, I didn’t wait a full year, and by and by, I began to make use of this great sacrament more and more frequently, despite not having mortal sin to bring every time. I actually prefer the term “Reconciliation” to “Confession” for this sacrament, because I am turning my heart and thoughts back to God in a manner right for our relationship. I *reconcile* with Him where I have gone astray. By His grace, I have found that my life has profoundly changed by making this form of prayer a regular part of my existence.

I’m sure few people would consider Reconciliation a form of prayer, but that’s exactly what it is. When we confess our sins to the priest, either face to face or behind the screen, we aren’t just talking to the man who sits there, but we are speaking to Christ, and what is prayer, but a conversation? Several years ago, I began to pray the Night Office of the Church and I developed a love for the Examen, which is a part of this Office.

During this portion of the prayer, we might thank God for our day and all the good that has passed, but we also take an inventory of our daily life, and in doing so, can begin to see patterns that develop, sins that we particularly struggle with, and we end with an act of contrition for our sins.

Though I am not required to go to Confession for my venial sin, we receive special grace when we do, and if I find that I so repeatedly turn away from our Lord in my behavior, then I know I need His help in overcoming it. By God’s grace, I have learned to love this way of communicating with Him. In the advice and words of wisdom from the priests. I have often been greatly encouraged in my spiritual battles. I have learned to more frequently view my life (and others) from God’s perspective, and *really* learned that despite my short-comings, I am still a deeply beloved daughter of the Father. Through my penance, the Holy Spirit has often revealed further understanding of these realities and has given me wisdom and understanding to make changes in my thoughts and actions. I am so grateful for that quiet whisper from Our Lord to return to the sacrament of Reconciliation, and I cannot express how deeply I wish we would all make good use of this form of prayer on a more regular basis, because it is sincerely life-changing.

May all glory and honor and praise be to God for ever and ever.
