Adults Should Be Seen and Not Heard

When we were children, many of us heard the saying, "Children should be seen and not heard." This was a simple lesson which meant, be quiet, listen, and learn from those who are older and wiser. Even though we are grown now, that lesson still has a spiritual truth—a truth about our relationship with God.

When it comes to the Lord and His Word, we must remember that we are still children. We need guidance, mercy, and wisdom. That is why we must learn to be quiet in His presence: to shut our mouths, to open our ears, and to receive what He wants to teach us.

So often we miss God's voice not because He is not there, but because our lives are too loud. The world has trained us to react, to argue, to scroll, to stay busy—until there is no room left for holy silence. When everything is noise, it becomes difficult to recognize the whisper of grace.

Elijah learned this when he fled for his life and hid in a cave while being hunted by Queen Jezebel. He was exhausted, afraid, and searching for God. But the Lord did not meet him in the dramatic signs or the great commotion. God drew Elijah out of the storm and into stillness, teaching him and us that His presence is often found not in spectacle, but in quiet surrender.

Job also struggled in a similar way. He was faithful, yet he lost his family, his health, his security, and his peace. He demanded answers and poured out words, but his suffering left him unable to listen. Only when his speaking ended could he finally hear the Lord—"The words of Job are ended." In the silence after our questions, God can begin to speak.

In what ways do we, like Elijah and Job, silence God by refusing to become silent ourselves?

- When sickness, loss, or sudden hardship comes, do we retreat into our own "cave," building walls of fear and resentment that keep God at a distance?
- Do we fill every quiet moment with noise—scrolling, work, endless activity—so that we never have to sit still long enough to hear what God is saying?
- When we come to Mass, are we truly listening to the Word of God, or is our mind crowded with a thousand other plans and distractions?

Today, let us choose silence—not emptiness, but attentiveness. Let's quiet our bodies, settle our minds, and soften our hearts, so the Lord has room to speak. His voice may not shout; it may come as a whisper.

Remember, before God, it may be best if adults are seen and not heard. Let us practice being present, receptive, and ready to listen.

Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: In this Sunday's gospel, the disciples are vividly aware that they are not in control of their circumstances. As they journey

on the "Barque of Peter" toward Jesus, who has gone before them to pray, it is the darkest part of the night and the wind is tossing the boat. They are seemingly alone. As Jesus appears to them on the water, they do not recognize Jesus and instead react precisely opposite to Jesus' intention for them – they fear what they believe is a ghost. When Jesus appears to us in the church, especially in ways that we do not expect, do we recognize him? Allow him to help us? Or do we think that we have to do it all ourselves – *our* church, *our* way? At this darkest moment, Jesus reassures the disciples in the boat that he is present with them, proving dominion over even the weather. Where Jesus is, there is no need for fear.

To Experience: How does God get your attention? In big ways or small ones? Is God direct or subtle? Does God have a sense of humor? God appears to each of us differently, making use of our own individuality and idiosyncrasies. Elijah and Peter have different experiences of God because they are different people in different circumstances. God desires to be with each of us, too, reaching out to us in our own unique ways.

1. How have you noticed God's presence, both in big and small ways? Where might God be trying to get your attention right now?

One by One Campaign & Narthex Project Update

St. Gregory Parish has received approval from the Diocese to proceed with the Narthex project. Bishop David Ricken signed his approval after a thorough review by the Diocesan Offices of Facilities and Properties, Divine Worship, and Finance and Accounting.

The Narthex, an approved one by One project, is designed to define a gathering and social space from the worship space (nave). The nave is where reverence for our Lord is paramount and must be observed with prayer and silence and in respect to those in prayer.

The funds for this project have been held in a separate account designated for one by One Campaign projects and are available to cover project costs.

We are in the process of informing those contractors who have been selected and approved by the Parish and Finance Councils to perform the work.

Gerard Hall, Director of Divine Worship for the Diocese, has visited our church twice regarding this project. He felt that creating the narthex would be positive in changing and realigning the space into what it should be, realizing a significant improvement from the appearance and function of today. He requested to be invited back after completion of the project!

It is anticipated but not yet confirmed that the actual building portion of the project will begin in January of 2027.

Service Witness Talk

My name is Allen Dietrich; I have been a member of St. Gregory's parish for 14 years. I currently serve St. Gregory Parish as an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion and beginning mid-July, as one of the parish Sacristans. Additionally, I serve as a member of the Finance Council and Building and Grounds Committee. Since 2018 I have served St. Gregory's as a Project Coordinator. I have been asked to talk a bit about service as it relates to stewardship in the Parish.

The three "T's" of stewardship are Time, Talent, and Treasure. Sharing of one's time and talent can be defined as service.

What else is service? Looking around the village of St. Nazianz, a portrait of many of those who have served their country are displayed on lamp posts. Volunteer firefighters and first responders serve the community and surrounding area that they live in. Those volunteer positions can be like a second job requiring significant time commitments. You may be relieved to know, **that** level of commitment is not what we are asking you to consider here. Young Christian groups, youth sports, and religious education all rely on volunteers to function. Our parish has members serving in assorted positions that are necessary for the parish to exist and thrive and many of those parishioners serve in more than one position. The church bulletin has and will continue to include a list of suggestions for volunteer opportunities within our parish. Have you seen the list? Have you ever considered how you might get involved? Do you see the list and decide there are others more qualified, or someone else certainly has more time to offer than you do?

My wife Linda told me some people want to be invited to serve in parish positions, on committees or to lend assistance on special projects. If that is true for you, I am here then to invite you to help our parish.

Why should you volunteer your time and talent? Some people volunteer out of a sense of obligation, this may be effective in getting the job done, but if it ends there, sadly, an especially important opportunity might be missed.

Instead, consider the person who receives personal satisfaction because of their volunteer efforts. They know their contribution is valuable and effective and helps the parish to function better, be more inviting, safer, comfortable, or pleasant.

The main entrance doors at SG were replaced about ten years ago. To conserve parish dollars, it was decided to finish the interior and exterior door trim with labor from parish volunteers. After the exterior trim was installed, it then required priming and painting. I recall like it was yesterday, a warm summer morning working alone, I began applying paint. Alone with my thoughts, I began to realize that I was working on a church built 150 years ago, during the civil war! Completed by very strong men using only horses, wagons, rope and wood scaffolding. I was humbled and questioned, "How was I even **allowed** to perform this task"?

Personal satisfaction is a great benefit to volunteering but consider an even greater outcome. Giving praise to the Lord for your abilities and knowledge, points out that every talent, skill, and intellectual capacity is a divine gift. By expressing gratitude, you honor the Creator, who endowed you with these strengths. James 1:17 reads as follows: "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights"

Please allow the Lord to work through you for the enhancement of our church and parish.

At St. Gregory's the narthex project is expected to be approved by Bishop Ricken in the next few days. That project will provide many opportunities to get involved and help with tasks that need extra hands for a short period of time.

I encourage you to review the list of suggested opportunities from the bulletin. The list will vary and may not be included every week, but please watch for it. Consider how you can help. Ask someone who is currently serving in a position or on a committee for more details. You may be surprised to learn the time commitment is small. Talk to your parish office. You will be welcomed gladly in all cases.

To borrow a phrase, that you may already have heard or perhaps seen on a billboard on the side of the highway, "**One call that's all!**"

Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary August 15

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her

earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names—Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.

Reflection

In the light of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, it is easy to pray her Magnificat (Luke 1:46–55) with new meaning. In her glory she proclaims the greatness of the Lord and finds joy in God her savior. God has done marvels to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply revered her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

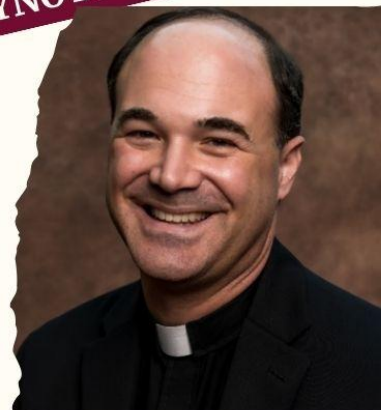
